that as an economist - as some sort of an economist.

In speaking of Edinburgh, I would like to take this opportunity of saying how much we appreciate the kindness of the representative of the British Council in making our knowledge of Edinburgh wider and deeper. And I would also like to express our pleasure at seeing here this evening the Chairman and the Secretary of the Edinburgh-Munich Committee of the Town Council and to thank them for coming so graciously to bid us farewell. And not least our thanks are also sincerely given to Frau Simonis, our Consul, for entertaining us so pleasantly on the day of our arrival.

And we, Mr. Principal, the members of all the universities, academies, and scientific institutions, we also fulfil social and public services of the highest order. We perform international services of the highest order in pursuing the aims invariably set for every member of that union of learned men and women, namely truth and liberty, out of which grow honesty and friendship.

Mr. Principal, Colleagues of the University of Edinburgh,
Mr. Secretary to the University and his Assistants, you have
given us such a kind reception and paid so much attention to us
that I cannot find the right words to express our deep gratitude.
We bring back to Munich University and to our Rector, Magnifizenz
