A book written for the most part by Marianus, founder of the Irish community at Regensburg. Described by A. P. Forbes soon after its arrival in Scotland, 'Account of a manuscript of the eleventh century by Marianus of Ratisbon', *PSAS* vi (1841-6), 33-40. *Trésors*, no. 3.

M. Dilworth, 'Scribe and monastic founder', *Scottish Gaelic Studies*, x (1968), 125-48, prints the inscriptions found in the lower margins of thirteen leaves, which record the scribe's progress, usually in the form of an invocation of the saint on whose day he was writing, for example (f. 23) 'Sancte uite pro missero mariano intercede'. The thirteen dates are: f. 1, 7 (?) June 1080; f. 4, 9 June 1080; f. 11, 11 June; f. 23, 15 June; f. 41, Friday, 19 June 1080; f. 48v, 20 June; f. 59, 26 June; f. 65, 29 June; f. 68, 1 July 'in nocte'; f. 84, 4 July; f. 96v, 8 July; f. 106v, 11 July 'in hac sabbati nocte', 1080; f. 122, 13 July 1080. The scribe calls himself Marianus on ff. 11, 23, 96v, 106v. He wrote in Irish in six inscriptions, using insular letter-forms.

Another scribe, John, began work on f. 122. Inscriptions by him are on f. 136v, 'Domine iesu criste propter tuam magnam misericordiam missero iohanni propitius esto', and on f. 141, 'Tertia kl' aprilis hodie in quinta feria. Anno domini millesimo octogessimo tertio (Thursday, 30 Mar. 1083). mee autem peregrinationis pene septimo. et huius loci habitationis ab scottis octauo. Regnante quarto henrico. Miseri iohannis¹ anima requiescat in pace amen': cf. also art. 8.

LSS
Arts. 2, 3, 4, 7, 8 correspond to arts. 1-5 of Munich, Clm. 13080, a twelfth-century book from the abbey of Prüfening, near Regensburg.

Vienna, Nationalbibliothek 1247 (Theol. 287) is another manuscript written by Marianus (in 1079): for a facsimile see *Pal. Soc.* i. 191. Another, now apparently lost, was written in 1074: see J. F. Kenney, *Sources for the early history of Ireland*, p. 617.

A statement that the manuscript is the autograph of Marianus and a table of contents are in a good italic hand, s. xvi, on the pastedown.

ff. 141. Thick parchment originally much holed and cracked, but before the scribes wrote defects were repaired with pieces of parchment sewn on with dark thread. 270 x 198 mm. Written space 202 x 135 mm. 32-3 long lines. The ruling is on two or three leaves at a time. Collation: 1-2¹⁰ 3⁸ 4-10¹⁰ (4 and 7 are half-sheets in quire 6) 11⁸+1 leaf after 5 (f. 104) 12 ten (ff. 108-17: 112, 113 are a bifolium) 13-15¹⁰ 16 four (ff. 138-41). Written in caroline minuscule of German type: for the scribes see above. The notes in Irish on ff. 41, 48^v are in Irish minuscule. Red initials. Capital letters in the ink of the text filled with red. Binding of wooden boards half-covered with stamped pigskin, executed in 1524. Secundo folio *Nam terrene*.

Written by Marianus (arts. 1-6, 10 and the headings of arts. 7, 8) and John (arts. 7-9) in

the Irish Benedictine house at Regensburg, founded by Marianus in 1075. 'Liber monasterii diu iacobi scotorum ratisponen' quem conuentus fecit denuo ligari 'anno domini 1524' inside the front cover, s. xvi¹. 'Ex lib: Monasterii S. Iacobi Scotorum Ratisbonæ redemit ex alienis manibus post centum circiter annos Bernardus Baillie abbas an. 1737'¹ on f. 1, at the top and down the side, partly over an inscription of s. xvi in faded brown ink. Erasure at foot of f. 1. Believed to have been brought to Fort Augustus when the Scottish abbey of St. James, which had taken the place of the Irish abbey in the second decade of the sixteenth century, was suppressed in 1862.

(b) f. 201^v A copy of the form of words used in the election of an abbot of the Irish Benedictine abbey of St. Giles, Nuremberg. The elector is described as 'abbas Mon' sancti Iacobi ybernicorum Ratisbone'. (c) f. 1^v Note of the death of Thomas, abbot 'monasterii S. Iacobi Scotorum extra muros . . . Heripolen', 14 Jan. 1494/5.

(b). The Irish at Nuremberg were replaced by Germans in 1418. The word 'ybernicorum' has been altered to 'scotorum' and the italicized letters are illegible. (c) has been partly rewritten, including the words in italics. The Irish were replaced by Germans at St. James, Würzburg, in 1497.

Collation: 1–7⁸ 8⁸ wants 7 after f. 61 9–12⁸ 13⁸ wants 2 after f. 96 14⁸ wants 6 after f. 107 15⁸ 16⁸ wants 8 after f. 124 17–25⁸ 26⁶. Quires numbered at the end. Written in two sizes of textura. A new hand begins at f. 167^v. Initials red or blue or, occasionally, in both colours. Bound in thick wooden boards covered with pigskin bearing a pattern of fillets, s. xvi in. (?): a central boss on each cover and metal cornerpieces: two strap-and-pin fastenings now missing: 'Regula diu Benedicti' written on the back cover. Secundo folio *Si equaliter* (f. 2) or *sapientissimum* (f. 4).

Written in Germany. The second scribe, Fuchstayn, wrote a poor hand. 'Iste liber est monasterii sancti Iacobi [. . .] rat', f. 202, s. xv ex.: 'Scotorum Ratisponen' is written over the erasure. 'Hunc librum sibi vendicant scoti rat' religiosi 1526. sancta brigida ora pro nobis', f. 202. 'Ex libris Monasterii S. Iacobi Scotorum Ratisbonæ', f. 1, s. xvi. A 3-line erasure, f. 202. Presumably brought from Regensburg in 1862: cf. Rat. 1.
