Initials at the beginning of each prologue in blue, violet, and magenta. Infilling consists of light blue vine scrolls with trefoil leaves in red and green. Gold blobs scattered on background. Some of the initials are inhabited by grotesques or animals. All the initials have cusped branches extending into the central column or the margins, ocassionally terminating in heads. The cusped branches of the initial on fol.32 extend into the lower margin and incorporate a man loosing an arrow at (?a monkey) who parries it with a shield and holds a sword. Blue and red 3 line penwork initials flourished in the contrasting colour at the beginning of each chapter. Running titles in alternate blue and red letters. Chapter nos. in alternate blue and red numerals.

Written in the Low Countries or Germany? in the fourteenth century. The binding is Germanic and nineteenth century. Owned by Canon Liddon who bequeathed it to the College in 1890.
